Year 4-6 Wellbeing Survey Results and the Influence of Berry Street Education

Staff have been busy analysing our results and we have had promising high-wellbeing growth in our Year 5-6 students with their learner readiness, perseverance, emotional regulation, and connection to a nurturing school climate. These results provide excellent data to support the impact that the Berry Street Education Model is providing for our senior students. The results have also identified areas of growth with explicit teaching opportunities to unpack student perceptions on how to further develop positive social interactions by providing them with strategies to do so. A Parent Forum is currently being organised in consultation with several other schools to be held at our site, with a date to be confirmed in the coming fortnight.
